

So we were dismayed and appalled when the Town of New Castle notified us last July that the Town had issued violation notices to Pruyn Sanctuary neighbors Yosef Haroush and Rebecca Marshall of 7 Mayberry Close for bulldozing an estimated 560 trees on their 5.25 acre property...and on SMRA's 92-acre Pruyn Sanctuary. The damage is extensive and profound. Whole trees with root balls, bulldozed into 8 to 10-foot piles to make room for additional illegal landfill, engulfing additional mature trees. This is not the first time the property owners have violated town ordinances related to property management, and seeing their landscapers mowing in the Sanctuary last summer added insult to injury. We and the Town of New Castle have extensively documented the damages.

SMRA initiated a civil suit for damages related to the mitigation of damage and restitution of the property the neighbors have despoiled. At this writing, the Town of New Castle's own court action is underway (The Town of New Castle v. Rebecca C. Marshall & Yosef Haroush) with ours to follow later. Keep track of this travail in local media, as we devote time and resources to countering bad behaviors.

On a lighter note, I recently had the pleasure of chatting with Jane and Walt Daniels, co-authors of *Walkable Westchester* (NYNJ Trail Conference), a guidebook to many of Westchester's 225 parks, now in its third edition. A pair of old soles (cringeworthy pun here), their story of how they started the book in the 2000s, the criteria for which parks to include or exclude, and the use of proxies — which included SMRA board members — to help update the trail coverage was an interesting conversation. Pick up a copy and find yourself a new adventure.

A final suggestion. I had the pleasure of sitting in on SMRA's informal trip planning Zoom a few weeks ago, and there is (almost) nowhere on the planet this group is unwilling to go or hasn't been. From day trips to week long international sojourns, keep your eyes peeled for upcoming announcements and don't be slow signing up; these



Order Deadline of September 5

Our 2024–2025 bird seed sale kicks off on Sunday, September 8 at Pruyn Sanctuary when our volunteers will be on hand to load your car from 10:00 am to 1:00 pm.

Please order by Thursday, September 5 for the above pickup date to have your seed ready to load.

Visit **www.sawmillriveraudubon.org/seed** to see our seed types and prices and order online. You may pay online with MasterCard or Visa, or via Paypal which also accepts Amex, or pay us via Zelle. You may also pay by cash or check when you pick up your seed.

Or you may prefer to do self-loading any office day, Monday, Wednesday, or Friday, 10:00 am to 3:00 pm at Pruyn Sanctuary. Our 2024–2025 seed order will be available starting Friday, August 30, and through the winter. Contact us in advance to ensure access: 914-666-6503 or office@sawmillriveraudubon.org.

We were pleased to see that wholesale prices for several seed types have actually dropped this year including the prices of black oil sunflower and sunflower chips.

The long-range winter forecast also suggests a snowier and colder winter so there may be more activity at our bird feeders than past winters.

If you are new to bird feeding and/or if you want to learn more about types of bird feeders and bird food to offer, and what feeder birds to expect in our area, be sure to visit Cornell Lab of Ornithology's Project FeederWatch, www.feederwatch.org.

You might also consider adding your bird feeder observations to FeederWatch to help track bird populations.

Come Geocaching With Us!


Geocaching is a high-tech outdoor scavenger hunting game or hobby where people using GPS enabled devices hunt for containers (geocaches) in the woods. In other words, what nerds do when they go outside. Cache containers range in size from tiny micros to extra large and may be cleverly camouflaged to blend into their surroundings. They usually include a log book and may contain trinkets to trade from previous cachers.

Geocaching began with 75 caches in 2000 growing to over 3 million around the world today. There are over 30,000 in NY state hidden by more than 5,000 cachers and approximately 1,500 caches in Westchester County including more than 30 caches in SMRA sanctuaries.

In the coming months, SMRA Treasurer Lynn Salmon will be leading a series of geocaching walks in our sanctuaries, starting with one in Pruyn on September 13. See details below. No experience or equipment is necessary.

Youth Scholarships Available

Having young birders at SMRA walks and other events is always such a delight: we admire the knowledge they've acquired at a young age and the perceptiveness and wonder they share with us.

For birders ages 13 to 17, SMRA is pleased to be able to offer scholarships for birding camps and other educational activities such as research trips. We can do so as a result of the generosity of family and friends of Larry Light, who established the Larry Light Memorial Scholarship Fund for Youth in 1981. Over the past 70 years, we have assisted more than 170 youth and adults with scholarships. The scholarships are not awarded based on financial need but on the level of interest shown by the student in the environment through coursework and/or extracurricular or volunteer activities. We especially focus on applicants who will apply their experience in ongoing environmental education and outreach in local communities, school, or work.

The maximum amount of our youth scholarship award varies based on funds available but has typically covered all or most program costs. Applicants select their program themselves and then apply for a SMRA scholarship.
